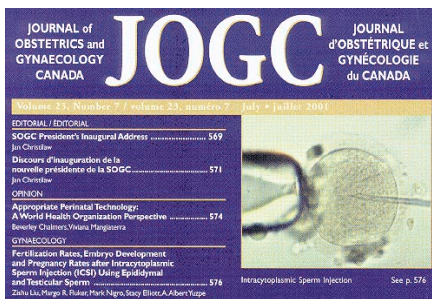

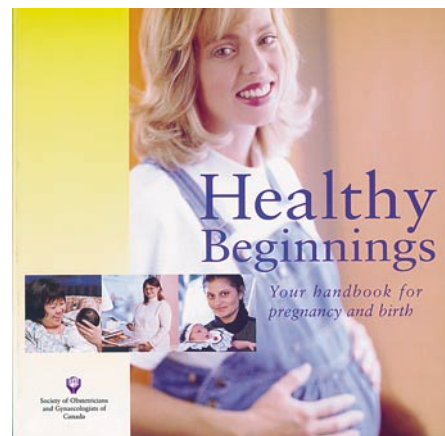

National Nursing Week

From files from the CNA

National Nursing Week (NNW) 2002 is almost upon us (6-12 May). The week is celebrated annually around the world and is timed to coincide with the anniversary of Florence Nightingale's birth, on 12 May, which is also International Nurses Day.

The theme of this year's NNW is **Nurses, Always There For You: Caring for Families.**

The theme promotes the family unit in its many forms and celebrates nursing's role in promoting the health of family members throughout the spectrum of health care services and at all stages of life. Registered nurses have a long tradition of providing the knowledge, skills and attention to the whole person that is central to family health.

Families today have diverse structures and functions. Trusting and close relationships between the nurse and individual family members from infancy to senior citizen and the family as a unit are characteristic of each and every model. Nurses have a responsibility to work with all family types and individual family members to promote health, prevent illness through counselling and education as well as provide curative and rehabilitation services. As such nurses are the single most effective advocate on behalf of family members of all ages and family health.

In addition, the CNA has entered into a partnership with The Globe and Mail and produced a special NNW 2002 supplement to inform The Globe and Mail readers about the scope and diversity of nursing through profiles of projects nurses are heading in

health promotion/illness prevention across cities and towns nationwide. The NNW 2002 supplement was published as part of the Monday, 6 May national edition of the newspaper.

Canadian Study Provides Evidence Linking Nursing Knowledge to Lower Mortality Rates

The first Canadian study linking care provided by registered nurses to reduced mortality rates was released in mid-March by the Institute for Clinical Evaluative Sciences (ICES). Among the study's most dramatic findings:

- A 10% increase in the proportion of RNs across urban and non-urban hospitals was associated with 5 fewer patient deaths for every 1,000 discharged patients.
- In urban community hospitals, each additional year of nurse experience on the clinical unit was associated with 6 fewer patient deaths for every 1,000 discharged patients.

This is to inform you of an important medical device problem with all products labeled as sterile or as ethylene oxide processed manufactured by A & A Medical of Alpharetta, GA. These devices may also be sold under the trade names of "A & A Medical", "Rocket USA" and "LifeQuest".

Some products manufactured by this company have been labeled and sold as sterile or as ethylene oxide processed but in fact may not have undergone any sterilization process. Infections associated with the use of these devices have been reported in the USA. To date, Health Canada has not received reports of

infections related to the use of these devices in Canada. Although the only Rocket USA product licensed for sale in Canada is the **Rocket Aspiration Set with Locking Syringe**, other products have been sold here.

ICME Planning Committee

This year, 217 people joined us at the Grand Marival Hotel in Nuevo Vallarta, Mexico, for the 2002 SOGC ICME program. The participants could not ask for a better location – a golfer's paradise, an ideal family center with lots to do for children, a relaxing atmosphere for those who just wanted to lounge around the beach.

Each morning, there was an outstanding scientific program offered. In fact, more than half of the participants felt that the overall subject matters covered during the scientific sessions would be very useful to their clinical practice. Among the most popular sessions were the presentations on HELLP syndrome; how to avoid complications of laparoscopy and hysteroscopy; overactive bladder; HRT-CVS benefits and risks; fetal alcohol syndrome; diabetes in pregnancy; fetal surveillance in labour; low dose HRT; abnormal pap smears; medico-

legal obstetrics; contraceptive counseling skills workshop; medico-legal cases of international women's health.

The SOGC's ICME planning committee continues to strive to meet the needs of its members in the planning of future events. As such, the following topics proposed by SOGC members are being considered for the 2003 ICME program – shoulder dystosia; medico-legal issues; pelvic mass; endoscopy-related topics; infertility in women over 40; inductions of previous SIJ patients; controversies of 2nd stage management; contraception; patient choice/consent issues re: treatment options.

We hope you will join us next year where an excellent scientific session will be offered within the confines of a piece of paradise - Trinidad. Further details will be communicated in early Fall.

Announcing A New Interactive Educational Program at the ACM:

Improved HRT Compliance Through Effective Communication

For the past two decades, healthcare providers have been challenged with recurring clinical issues related to hormonal replacement therapy (HRT). Proper interpretation of the evolving literature and the translation of this current information to patients is necessary for effective counseling for women seeking advice about HRT. Through an unrestricted educational grant from Pfizer Canada, an interactive program for obstetricians/ gynaecologists and family physicians has been developed to support their educational needs, enabling them to effectively counsel women and address their concerns about HRT.

This instructional program is structured in a small group learning environment. With the facilitator, using clinical practice scenarios and provided with the resource of expert opinion in a CD ROM format, participants will share, interpret and assess best practices based on current literature in addressing the 10 most frequent clinical presenting problems associated with HRT. The learning environment will also provide opportunity for participants to practice with their knowledge base in simulated counseling sessions.

University Corner

“Showers” of greetings to all SOGC Junior Members from the west coast residents at UBC. In fact, the Vancouver winter 2001-2002 has been unseasonably cold with more of the white stuff than is the norm. All the more to ski on, we say.

In the last year, our program has advanced technologically with the introduction of a PDA (Personal Digital Assistant) tracking system. All residents now carry a PDA. They are used to access medical information from texts and drug databases as well as log procedures performed. The main purpose of this system is to provide an up-to-date and complete list of surgical cases performed and provide feedback to both the resident and program. After each case, the resident records details of the procedure followed by

the attending staff who will also document, on the residents' PDA, a critique of their performance using a standardized form. Each week at academic half-day, residents will hot-sync their PDAs with the department's data base. It is our hope that this system will enhance the evaluation of each resident at our individual review sessions. We have modeled this system after that which is already in place at McMaster University. Thank you!

Annual Research Day

Sherbrooke University's first Annual Obstetrics & Gynaecology Research Day was held on February 1st. In our programme, each resident is initiated to the field of research by conducting a research project or by finishing a project which was started by another resident. This day was the opportunity for each of us to present our project, whether it was completed or ongoing. The jury was comprised of Dr. Jean-Marie Moutquin, Chief of Obstetrics & Gynaecology at the Sherbrooke University Health Centre (SUHC), Dr. Jacques Simard, researcher from Québec and Dr. Jean-Pierre Tétrault, anesthesiologist and member of the SUHC's clinical research unit. The jury's mandate was to award prizes to the two best completed research projects and the best ongoing one.

Congratulations to Dr Sophie Desindes who won 1st prize for her completed research project on The effectiveness of misoprostol in facilitating cervical dilatation during a diagnostic hysteroscopy and to Dr. Claude Laplante who won 2nd prize for

her completed research project comparing Misoprosol on its own vs. misoprostol with methotrexate vs. surgical pregnancy termination in the case of early abortion. Two residents, Drs. Valérie Dôme and Karen Desrosiers tied for 1st prize for their ongoing research project, respectively, nitroglycerine's effects on uterine relaxation in sheep undergoing hyperstimulation, and The efficacy of estradiol-17 β as a prophylactic agent for menstrual migranes.

We wish to hereby commend the hard work of all the residents, especially the R1s who had to work very diligently to prepare and present a research protocol, all of whom were quite interesting. We also wish to highlight the work of all the professors who contributed directly or indirectly to all these projects. Last but not least, a warm thank you to Dr. Paul Bessette, gyn/oncologist at the SUHC, principal driving force behind this research day, and active participant in many of our ob/gyn department's research protocols.

Junior Member University Corner

Dr. Monica Brunner, McGill University

These days we're all aware of the emphasis placed on training us to be researchers as well as clinicians. I thought others might be interested to learn what we are doing at McGill to try to improve our skills in research, statistics and epidemiology.

We used to send our 1st year residents to an introductory statistics and to an epidemiology course. This was abandoned because the stats course was not really geared to clinicians and residents didn't feel any better able to analyse a paper at completion. On the other hand, the epidemiology course was adapted to residents with examples taken from the medical literature and so was more appropriate and more popular. Overall, we still didn't feel that we had the tools to carry out research however.

Our new strategy is to substitute a research lecture series into our Wednesday afternoon teaching. We now have a staff person with experience in research who has prepared 6 weeks (1 hour each) of interactive sessions on research/stats/epid., the intent being to teach us the basics we need to know to correctly interpret a study or to set up our own research project. Feedback so far is positive.

We are also altering the focus of our journal club a little. We still all meet every Friday at lunch to review a current paper but in addition to focusing on findings and their applicability to practice we are trying to devote more time to critical appraisal of the paper, ie) was the method sound and were the stats used appropriate.

Of course none of these efforts are possible without the constant input and attendance of staff experienced in research and we appreciate that the burden falls repeatedly on a few people. We are also open to new ideas. Does anyone out there have a better way?
