Tremendous cost increases for medico-legal insurance for obstetrics in Ontario

he SOGC and the Ontario Society of Obstetrics and Gynaecology are working together in trying to resolve the tremendous cost increases for medico-legal insurance for obstetrics in Ontario. Meetings are on-going on a regular basis and contacts are being made with the Government of Ontario as well as with the Ontario Medical Association. Our actions are coordinated and we believe that a viable solution for our members in July or early August.

Suggestions made by the SOGC 5 to 6 years ago were not implemented and nor deemed appropriate and now we are paying the consequences. The SOGC position has always been that complete risk management should be undertaken by CMPA as well as pressure on government to introduce TORT Reform. It has become evident that one will not happen without the other.

The SOGC is often accused of being against CMPA. This is completely false, however, we do have a major difference of opinion in terms of the SOGC wanting CMPA to get involved with true risk management for the benefits of patients and our members in Canada. Without physicians taking on a serious role in risk management, we do not believe governments will act on TORT Reform.

In the current situation in Ontario, the SOGC believes that all parties should agree to work on risk management. The SOGC has lobbied strongly for the government subsidy to apply on January 1st, thus eliminating the burden of financieng for 18 mounths the

medical-legal insurance costs.

The SOGC is willing to sit down with CMPA and take a fresh look at our proposals of 5 to 6 years ago and work with them towards establishing risk management, especially for the at-risk specialties. More than 40% of the cost of operating CMPA and making payments for litigation come from the three high-risk specialties, obstetrics, orthopedics and neurosurgery. However, we only account for about 3-4% of membership in the CMPA and therein lies the problem.

The SOGC, with the Ontario Regional Committee and the Ontario Society of Ob/Gyn, is committed to working as many hours or days as necessary to resolve this issue for the benefit of obstetrical care in Ontario and to help our members in this difficult situation.

Editor's Note: As we go to press, an agreement was reached between the Governement of Ontario, OMA and CMPA that adresses the majority of issues raised by our members.




Knowing about the Birds and the Bees is not Enough - SOGC has a new Sex Sense Book

clearly outlined. The book's upbeat graphic design was created by seven students and their professor from the Department of Design Art




at Concordia University in Montreal.

2001 Walter C. Mackenzie Surgical Fellowship

rigin: The fellowship was named after Dr. Walter C. MacKenzie, a renowned Canadian surgeon, former Dean of Medicine at the University of Alberta, and former President of the Royal College.

Objective: To enable Fellows to visit one or more centres to acquire surgical research or clinical surgical expertise. Knowledge gained should have a direct application to the recipient's clinical surgical practice.

Eligibility: Applications are available to practising surgeons who are Fellows in good standing of the Royal College and must reside in Canada. "Practising surgeons" are surgeons who have spent at least 50% of their professional time in active clinical surgery over 5 years post certification.

Selection: The selection is based on the overall merit of the application and the degree to which the proposal meets the described objectives. Specifically, the committee assesses: (a) the benefits to the individual and to the community; (b) the quality of the program to be undertaken; (c) the financial need and funds available to the applicant.

Number: One fellowship offered annually.

Value: \$1,750 per month for up to 12 months (maximum of \$21,000).

Applicable for visits of 6 to 12 months' duration. An amount equivalent to 75% of the award will be given at the beginning of the fellowship, and the remainder upon receipt of the final report at the end of the fellowship. The fellowship may be used to supplement financial assistance granted from other sources.

Closing Date: September 29, 2000 (date of receipt) for the year 2001 fellowship. Late applications will not be

considered. Fellowships should ideally begin in the year 2001, but may commence in 2000. However, disbursement of money awarded for the year 2001 fellowship will not occur until January 2001.
